

Music Doth Soothe the Savage Breast (mine)

Double your pleasure (April 30) Victoria Chamber Orchestra (May 8)

After a long, cold winter, spring was ushered in on April 30 by conductor Peter Dent as we listened to not only our own Coro Galiano but also our pleasure really was doubled by Peter's new choir, Ekoos Vocal Ensemble coming here bringing BIG stringed instruments (cellos, double basses) on the ferry, practising together, sleeping overnight, having a celebration party at Virginia Bobsien's and then both choirs departing on the 7:40 am ferry next morning to give an afternoon performance at Sooke. To my untutored ear, the music was wonderful! – My first thought was 'Peter's done it again.' His artistic magic has produced two groups, but what organisation and generous effort by every person to Double our Pleasure. Famous classical music by Rachmaninoff, Bach and the like, were sung mostly acapella in the composer's original language (even Russian!) requiring perfect pitch. It didn't matter that Galiano's faithful accompanist Will Guthrie was unable to accompany, recovering from a serious heart surgery, Sooke's celloist Ellen Himmer filled the breach, while Susanne Laughlin eased Peter's load by conducting Schumann's "Three Songs from Dichterlieber" and "Three Latin Motets Op. 38."

While our home group were clearing the Hall, the Sooke friends sang a wickedly humorous original ditty on the pluses and minuses of BC Ferries.

I hadn't realised until now how important it is to belong to a strong group, although we are all familiar with the adage "Together we can move molehills or mountains." My congratulations to Peter Dent and both choirs, with my heartfelt admiration.

This feeling of magic coming about through a leader and his group was reinforced nine days later by the next musical delight when more than thirty members of Victoria Chamber Orchestra under the leadership of Yariv Aloni came to our South Hall for the last of the Concert Series on Sunday May 8. It is a rare opportunity to have a front-stall seat by a group of this calibre, to catch the nuances and the connections between the conductor and his musicians and soloists. I was struck too by the helpfulness of this group as they set out the chairs themselves for musicians and audience. They had brought with them a young soloist Eejoon Kwon, only three years in this country from Korea who had won the Louis Sherman Concerto Competition in February for young emerging string players. Louis Sherman was a kind and generous friend to many of the musicians on stage. On his death, his daughter helped to set up an Annual Competition to encourage rising young strings players including the use of her father's bow. Eejoon Kwon stood before us to make that bow whisper or play powerfully as she played the solo in "Mozart's concerto for violin and orchestra in A major K219." The young girl, who is also a fine ensemble player, knew every note inside her head, completely self-possessed without any written music – a brilliant future forecast by many of her Galiano audience.

A further musical delight was the newly commissioned "Island Arioso" with the composer Brent Straughan to give us a most entertaining explanation of why he decided to set to music a story about our Gulf Islands after going on a whaling canoe trip with a Kwakiuti guide near Tofino. He learnt that within living memory every island village had a paddle song. If

silence greeted your paddle song as you sang, that meant hostile intent. Straughan had the novel idea of creating a string serenade for three of our Gulf Islands Saturna, the two Penders and Galiano. Also included is a Ferries theme, not just the low D as they pass each other, but announcements, newspapers, conversations. Exciting, yes it was especially when novel instruments were used, Like SAWS and HAMMERS. All I can say is WONDERFUL. You should have been there. CDs will be available I'm told.

Galiano Health Care Society

Ken Kucille, Maintenance Director, Medical Centre

As part of being on the Board for the Galiano Health Care Society, directors' volunteer for certain jobs for which they are best suited. I volunteered to do the maintenance director's job as this is the type of work that I have doing all my life. Being in the elevator trade for 34 years and having an appreciation for classic cars and an ability to work on them has its advantages when it comes to mechanical items.

The tasks that we do at the clinic are to ensure that all operating systems are functioning properly. This includes the emergency generator and all electrical items, as well as repairs to furniture, locks, the septic system, plumbing and many other items – items that you might expect to need repair in your own home.

There is a long list of repairs and upgrades that must be done to the building in the near future. Some of these were discussed at the last Annual General meeting, such as the replacement of the carpet and earthquake preparedness. The carpeted areas are to be replaced with tile or vinyl material which is easier to keep clean. At the AGM, our president, James Schmidt asked people to come forward and make large tax-deductible contributions to cover the costs associated with the carpet replacement and several islanders have subsequently made significant contributions. The Board is trying very hard to find government funding to support repairs and upgrades to the Centre and are also organising fund-raising events. One of the current fund raisers is a raffle of a quilt made by the ladies of the Galiano Needlework Guild. Please support your Health Care Clinic by purchasing a ticket.

The Board is always on the lookout for volunteers who have specific skills that can help out occasionally in areas such as carpentry, plumbing, electrical, painting, roofing, landscaping, labouring and even lawn cutting. If you can donate some time to work in any of these areas, please call Linda at the clinic and she will put your name on a list so you can be contacted when needed.

The clinic is currently facing a monetary deficiency due to the lack of a doctor to cover certain costs such as rent and the medical office assistants working at the reception desk. Despite VIHA covering a portion of these costs, the clinic has had to provide some additional funding in order to keep the doors open. There are two main problems facing the Society now: one (that everyone knows about) is the lack of a doctor and two, the financial situation. Please consider changing your doctor to the one at the clinic (whenever he/she arrives) – this will assist in making the case that Galiano needs a full-time doctor. Similarly, we need to show that the other services available at the clinic, such as podiatrist, chiropractic, lab technician, nurse practitioner, dentist, hygienist and home support nurse are all services that are needed and used by the local community.

••• Tickets for the Galiano Health Care Society are still on sale at the Galiano Bookstore and the Health Center. All proceeds from the quilt project will do toward the replacement of the carpet flooring with a material that meets current standards of sanitization and infection prevention. If every resident of Galiano buys one ticket we will be \$5000 closer to our goal of \$18000 for the new floor.

ANONYMOUS FLYERS

On April 21, 2011, during the Library Referendum campaign, all Galiano mailboxes received an unsigned, unattributed flyer. Along with many islanders, the Galiano Library Society Board believes the content was defamatory and inaccurate. As the flyer was anonymous, the publisher has not been accountable to the community for the content nor has the publisher engaged in civil, public discussion about the issues raised in the flyer.

The Board of the Galiano Library Society wants to inform the Galiano Island community that **anonymous flyers violate Canada Post regulations.** With the continuing goal of community civility and open, honest dialogue, the Galiano Library Society is publishing these regulations below.

CANADA POST REGULATIONS

Unaddressed admail—Customer Guide

2.2.3 Customer Identification

Each Unaddressed Admail item must bear the Customer's name.

In the case of co-op mailings and/or mailings completed on behalf of a group, the name of the Customer (i.e., the owner of the co-op mailing or of the mailing completed on behalf of the group) must be clearly identified on the item, for example: Mailed by "NAME OF CUSTOMER (SENDER)" in order to inform the recipient of who the sender is.

- 3 Customer's Obligations
- 3.1 The customer agrees to prepare and mail items in accordance with this Agreement.

We trust that in the future all mailers from our local post office will follow these regulations. In our democracy, we expect no less.

A Touch of Class - Maybe (or not)

During the past twenty-five years, I have had time to casually observe the various comings and goings of the residents, businesses and the direct connections to and from the Gulf Islands. Naturally, there have had to be adaptations made along the way to conform with the cost of living - such as ferry fare increases. Newer ships arrived to supplement or replace the 'dependable regulars'; they were the Queen of Chilliwack, the Queen of Capilano, the Queen of Cumberland (!); the Spirit 'sisters'; the Skeena Queen; the Island Sky; and the three Coastal 'sisters' (for the main routes). Ship retirements of note were the Queens of Sidney, Tsawwassen, Vancouver, Victoria, Saanich, Esquimalt, Saltspring Queen, Vesuvius Queen and Mill Bay. Various dock repairs or rebuilds occurred at almost every local facility; and, yes, privatization - the list goes on and on!

There was one minor item which I neglected to mention and this has had something to do with the service to and from Tsawwassen on Route 9. Within the past year or so, I happened to notice a slight change with regards to the style of public announcing at Tsawwassen Terminal. Apart from the usual 'ready for boarding' and 'last call' - for the direct to Swartz Bay (Victoria) and the Duke Point (Nanaimo) routes, the call for 'our' Route 9 services seemed to become a lot less informative and/or familiar to my ears. Apparently, due to a 'name similarity' ('ship' to (location'), a procedural decision from someone somewhere was made to eliminate public confusion. Why, does one ask? Because of a local vessel's name! The 1963 - built MV (Motor Vessel) Queen of Nanaimo, which has provided continuous service faithfully and reliably between Long Harbour (Saltspring), Otter Bay (Pender), Village Bay (Mayne), Sturdies Bay (Galiano) and the mainland, was causing 'travel issues' whenever she reached her Berth 2 destination. Her first route assignments, incidentally, were either the Horseshow Bay to Langdale (the Sunshine Coast), or the Horseshoe Bay to Departure Bay (Nanaimo!) runs, where she served until the mid 1970s. Due to the nature of the types of routes out of Tsawwassen, since the introduction of the Duke Point to Tsawwassen route, there were numerous times when both the Duke Point and our Route 9 ferries were in dock at the same time (Big Deal, you say?). The concern kept arising with this one minor variation to the 'name to destination' similarity: the Queen of Nanaimo does not go to Nanaimo! (She sails to Gulf Island ports only - Sturdies Bay, Village Bay, Otter Bay and Long Harbour); so, what was the 'eventual' solution?

To end this travelling public dilemma, the procedure at present dictates that the services (which are also provided by the MV Bowen Queen during the summer months) shall only be announced generally and not specifically; therefore, we now have Unidentified Floating Objects (UFOs) called the 'Gulf Island Ferries' which will not be designated by name! I compared this announcement procedure to the procedure for the Swartz Bay and Duke Point sailings and fairly quickly deduced that whenever these vessels were in their berths, they were properly and promptly identified! I use the service to and from Swartz Bay on the Mayne Queen and the Queen of Cumberland numerous times - and have not once heard about any of these issues with reference to the 'name to destination' in relation to the announcements about the numerous ships based there. It may seem a little nostalgic, but the idea of not verbally identifying a public conveyance properly - by its 'real name' - does not cut it with this resident.

SO WHAT if this vehicle (ferry/bus/taxi/train/plane) has a 'name to destination' similarity or difference? When a vehicle is given a name to honour a place or person, it establishes IDENTITY! Without identity, something is 'lost in translation'; eventually, this 'object' becomes impersonal or generic, or worse – just a statistic... This would be akin to calling the RMS (Royal Mail Steamer) Queen Mary just an ocean liner or the OV (Orbiter Vehicle) Endeavour just another Space Shuttle. It seems to me that this 'solution' only causes an identity crisis which makes absolutely no sense at all and seems to promote the 'just another number' mentality which utterly lacks character. No 'Gulf Island Ferry' for me, please - the MV Queen of Nanaimo or Bowen Queen designations are far more informative as they are 'historically accurate' and were meant to be used to honour the various regions or communities; therefore, these fine ships should be given the respect that they should still deserve...

A Matter of Perspective

During the busier travel times of the year, especially on holiday weekends and the summer months, there are times when I find it amusing to listen to the radio broadcasts, especially when there are 'scheduled' traffic reports. Although they are as informative as the news and sports bulletins, I get rather disappointed and frustrated whenever they mention statistics regarding local ferry travel. Oh yes, it is vital that there is some word about delays due to weather or malfunctions - such as the early May 'redocking malfunction' of one of the 'Coastal' class ferries at Swartz Bay - but (and I do mean BUT) there is a limit to the types of reports about the ferry system; in particular, regarding the sailings out of Tsawwassen to the Southern Gulf Islands (as mentioned in the article "A Touch of Class"). I recalled that there was a VERY humorous performance by the Saltspring Hysterical Society which illustrated the possibilities of standardizing travel - namely, running a ferry system as one



would run an airport - and have come to the conclusion that this standardizing idea does have one drawback; one size does not always fit all, when it comes to the Route 9 ferries (the Bowen Queen or Queen of Nanaimo sailings).

Although the need to mention vehicle capacity is much appreciated, this is the only amount of news which is appropriate to this run; the idea of 'sailing waits' ARE IRRELEVANT to the Gulf Islands sailings, since there are far fewer departures from the mainland. To mention that the reservation spaces are fully booked is also fine; however, if there was a 'three or four sailing wait' and there are only two departures on the same day, this information is meaningless! Until there is a time when more sailings are available, this detail can not and should not exist. Who knows when this will eventually change ('the shadow knows')? Sometime, maybe...

Pancho the Juggler returns

When the dust settled after the spectacularly successful "Galiano's Got Talent" show, the name Paul Gregory started popping up in conversations – as in "I didn't even know he played the harmonica" or "the harmonica playing was awesome". Probably one of the reasons that you don't hear Paul's name is that he's a pretty quiet guy who is most often heard playing the position of back-up for other musicians. His moniker at the Canmore Festival is "that guy from B.C.". But that guy is very much a musician.

Here's how it all got started. Paul, an "Air Force brat", was born in England, but soon headed to New Brunswick, jumped to Montreal and then Toronto. When his harmonica-playing Dad got posted in the Yukon, the family headed off in the car for the long drive across Canada. Now we assume our men in uniform are courageous, but his Mom and Dad should both be given a special medal – they put five year old Paul in the back seat and handed him a harmonica. It was a long, long drive and I shudder at the thought – but obviously this little kid had enough talent to avoid being abandoned on the side of a deserted dirt road.

By grade three the family and the harmonica headed back to Toronto. Paul continued playing "the harp" and in high school band he expanded his repertoire by playing trumpet. After graduating in the early 70s Paul did what so many young men back then did – he got a logging job in Trois Rivieres and he played in a band. The seven members of United Power toured primarily in eastern Canada and NE United States and they were in Paul's words "pretty good", but it came to an end as the job market changed and the boys in the band got married. Paul was left with fond memories of playing with several great musicians including a one night stand with John Lee Hooker before following jobs to the Yukon.

Paul continued to work and started training as an electrician – and he played his harmonicas. When a notice was posted for musicians to try out for the Faro Folk Festival, someone came and said that he had to try out – right now! Without a chance to get his head around the idea he was off to the audition. Paul says he played briefly and was stopped with the words "you're in" and a whole new musical opportunity opened for him. The CBC taped the festival and immortalized a song that Paul had written for a pretty and recently divorced young woman that he had met there. One day Paul was listening to CBC's program "Touch the Earth" when suddenly he heard "To Adrienne" being played. One look at his face when he was telling me this said everything – and yes, he married her.

With an instant family, that included a 4 and 5 year old, Paul and Adrienne moved to Calgary where Zachery and Anna could start school. Soon after their child Christopher joined the family and much later Anna's daughter Amy. During the ensuing 25 years Paul continued to play in his spare time and 15 years ago he started volunteering at the Canmore Folk Festival as part of the house band, "Ronnie (Marra) and the Bag Boys". They play between performances and serve up music at the pancake breakfasts that feed the folk crowd and put dollars in the local food banks coffers. He has had great fun doing this and has enjoyed playing with people such as Amos Garrett, Kelly Jay, Hugh Hancock, Murray McLaughlin, Mark and Dylan Sadlier-Brown and David "Too Tall" Kampman. He is already plotting on how he's going to get to this years event.

By 2000 Paul and Adrienne had left Calgary and the pressures of city living and landed on Galiano where Paul continues to pursue his work as an electrician and play his harmonicas. Paul, who owns about 20 of these instruments, refers to them as harps – and their origin can be traced back to the Aeolian harp. Aeolus, Greek god of the wind, had an instrument named after him: it was hung outdoors and played when wind blew through strings. Later versions called Aeolinas, believed to be direct predecessors of present day harmonicas, were designed for a person to blow through a strip of reeds.

This is an instrument that has many obviously earned nicknames such as mouth harp or tin sandwich. Breaking in a harp is a slow process and the original instruments, made of metal and wood, were particularly hard on the mouth – hence the French harmonica name "ruines babines or ruins the lips". Paul remembers ending many a concert with a bloody mouth. Today, softer, kinder plastics are more commonly used.

There are basically two types of harps – chromatic and diatonic. Paul owns a chromatic harp which, when using a slide, can produce all the same notes as a piano. Usually used for symphonic and written music Paul doesn't play it often. He's more of a blues/blue grass/country rock harp player and like jazz players he is constantly adapting to the instruments around him. He carries a selection of diatonic harps with him when he plays — partly because each harp is in a different key, but also for backup in case the instrument "blows out". "Bending" notes is particularly hard on the harp.

Paul told me a story about how as a youngster he tried to buy a harp that would "bend notes" so that he could play like the great Paul Butterfield or Sonny Terry, but the salesman just offered the regular brands of harmonica, often referred to as "blues harps" — they "didn't work" for Paul until he accidentally discovered that it's all about technique. Needless to say he's never looked back.

Paul smiles when he refers to himself as "that guy from B.C". Even though this unassuming musician has about 20 original scores tucked under his belt and while he is usually found playing back-up at local venues, he has proven that he is quite capable of taking over center stage and playing from his heart as he did at Galiano's talent show. Not bad for a guy who, waiting for surgery to repair a torn rotary cuff in his shoulder, could only play one handed that night. Just imagine what he can do once that shoulder heals! Let's hope that Paul will be playing front and centre on the stage again soon.

New to the "Blues"? I asked Paul who he would recommend you listen to. With no hesitation he said the best in the world today is Carlos del Junco, but late greats Stevie Ray Vaughan, Sonny Terry, John Lee Hooker and Paul Butterfield are still favorites along with contemporaries David Gogo and Eric Clapton.



Up the Street

With June comes the promise of summer and several excellent episodes of Coronation Street, compliments of its three most dysfunctional families: the Barlows, the Platts and the Websters. In addition to the usual gossip- mongering, lying, cheating and scheming, June's storylines offer themes of pregnancy, babies and secrets revealed. The highlight of the month is, however, Roy and Hayley's impending wedding.

A big, white, fairy tale wedding is the dream of every *Corrie* bride, but not necessarily her reality, as most of Corrie's fiftyseven weddings (CBC timeline) can attest. If something can go wrong, it does: somebody doesn't show up who should; somebody shows up who shouldn't; an unexpected "I don't," rather than the anticipated "I do." A Corrie wedding dream can turn to nightmare for any given reason. A massive heart attack killed Fred Elliott's 2006 marriage to Bev Unwin. The local constabulary crashed Dev and Sunita Alahan's 2004 Hindu wedding and arrested the bride on false charges. In 2003, Peter Barlow committed bigamy when he first married his fancy woman (and mother of little Simon), Lucy Richards, then a few episodes later, married his fiancée Shelly Unwin. That same year, Tracy Barlow maliciously manipulated Roy Cropper into a sham wedding after she duped him into believing he was the father of (then infant) Amy! (It's a long story!!!). There was the piss-drunk bride in 2009 (Becky McDonald) and the bloodsplattered groom in 2007 (Vernon Tomlinson.) We can only hope that luck throws a big bouquet of good fortune on the wedding of the future Mr. and Mrs. Cropper.

"But aren't they married already?" This question not only puzzled Hayley's friends, but also many post-millennium Corrie viewers. Undeniably, the pair appear happily married. Happy they are, but married they are not. Folk easily forget that Hayley is a transsexual. Prior to 2004, the UK government refused to recognize its transsexual citizens as their new gender. Despite having every inch of Harold lopped off in a 1998 sex-change operation, Hayley remained Harold in the blind eyes of the British government.

Unable to marry legally, Roy and Hayley instead committed to each other in a near-botched civil blessing ceremony held at Roy's Rolls in 1999. Hayley legally changed her last name from Patterson to Cropper as her wedding gift to Roy.

Some of the wedding scenes were taped off the Street and on location in the Lancashire countryside, at Tatton Hall in Cheshire and at Heaton Park near Manchester. Likewise, train buffs will enjoy the scenes featuring the Lancashire Fusilier steam locomotive. Completed in 1927 and named in 1928, the steam engine took its name from The Lancashire Fusiliers, a British infantry regiment. For interested readers and I know of one in Montréal, the steam engine stats are located at the end of this article, following the spoilers.

The Cropper wedding stretches over two episodes that will air on Monday June 20 and Tuesday June 21, respectively, granted CBC does not deviate from its current schedule.

Manchester, UK, the home of Coronation Street, hosted his year's British Soap Awards on Saturday May 14. Nominated in seventeen categories, Coronation Street walked away with

nine awards. Michelle Keegan (plays Tina McIntyre) won Sexiest Female for the second year running. Best Comedy Performance went to Patti Clare (plays Marie Taylor). Best **Dramatic Performance** went to Jane Danson (plays Leanne Battersby). Alexander Bain (plays young Simon Barlow) took Best Young Performance. An actor, whose character is still in the CBC timeline, won both **Best Exit** and this year's **Lifetime Achievement Award.** (Inquiring minds can find the name of the soon-to-depart actor at the end of the spoilers.) The culmination of the Webster/Dobbs ordeal secured **Best Storyline** and the upcoming Tram Crash earned Spectacular Scene of the Year. Finally, Corrie's hour-long, live, 50th Anniversary show won **Best Single Episode**.

In addition, the BBC, made for TV, docudrama Road to Coronation Street recently acquired two prestigious awards. One, **Best Single Drama** at the Royal Television Society Awards and two, a Gold World Medal at the New York Festivals International Television and Film Awards.

It was touch and go for actor Betty Driver last month. Driver, who plays barmaid Betty Williams, was rushed to hospital with suspected pneumonia. Doctors told family, friends and colleagues to "expect the worst." Driver, who celebrated her 91st birthday while in hospital, has since improved and looks forward to leaving hospital and returning to work.

Corrie brass awarded 18-year-old actor Brooke Vincent a new, twelve-month contract. The young actor, who plays teenage lesbian Sophie Webster, says that she is having the time of her in the role and is "thrilled" with her new contract.



Lions Bursary Award, Pancake Breakfasts and Easter Seal Camps

Well, you did it again! You helped the Galiano Lions put on another successful annual Seafood Dinner back there on April 16 and for that we say thank you indeed. Thank you to those who bought tickets to attend. Thank you to all those who dug deep into their pockets to bid on a host of items up for grabs in the silent and live auctions. Thank you to all the individuals and businesses, both on and off Galiano, who donated items for the auctions and also for the door prizes. And thank you to all of you who purchased raffle tickets prior to the event in anticipation of winning one of the three valuable prizes. Finally we shouldn't forget the valuable assistance given to us by all the Lionettes and non-members in helping cook and prepare the dinner, set up and festively decorate the Lions Hall and in dismantling everything the following day. THANK YOU to you all.

Financially, it was a successful fundraiser, (not quite as good as 2010 but considering the general economic climate facing the nation we are very happy). Now we come to the task of spending it wisely. One item will be the donation of a \$2000 bursary to a Galiano student completing grade 12 this summer. There is still time for students to apply but be aware that mid-June is the deadline. All applicants must be full time residents of Galiano and academic prowess will not be the only criteria in judging a winner. Behavioural attitude and community participation, both in and out of school, will also be considered. Students must show that they have a specific course of further education in mind, either at college, university or an apprenticeship and the award must be used for this purpose. So to all you Galiano grade twelvers, if you haven't done it already and you need a couple of grand to get you started on the next stage of life's journey, get your applications in now and make life difficult for our awards committee. While on the subject of children and youth, B.C. has its share of children with disabilities and for decades, in addition to medical advances being made, much is being done by organizations to help these young people lead fuller lives. B.C. Lions Clubs are one of those organizations. In 1947 the B.C. Lions Society for Children with Disabilities was formed and began providing a private bus service to enable such children to get to school, doctors appointments and other important appointments. Two decades later it had grown to the largest private bus service in North America and by integrating with the Easter Seals franchise work began on creating Easter Seals

Houses and Easter Seals Camps. The houses provide affordable accommodation for children receiving medical treatment. The child stays free of charge and the families stay at subsidized rates. There are currently three houses in B.C. located in Vancouver, Victoria and Prince George.

The camps provide summer fun for disabled children to 'give and grow' in a safe, inclusive and nurturing environment and are provided at no charge to the children and their families. There are three camps in B.C. (one of which is at Lake Shawnigan on Vancouver Island) and over 800 children attend the weeklong sessions each summer. Over the rest of the year the camp facilities are rented to schools for various events.

It is to Camp Shawnigan and the Victoria Easter Seal House that the Galiano Lions Club donates funds. The Galiano Foodbank, the Heart and Stroke Foundation (through its Big Bike Ride) and Canadian Leader Dogs for the Blind are among the other organizations we support.

The list goes on and so does the need for us to have fundraising events.

The next one will be on June 19, Fathers Day. It will be a Pancake Breakfast at the Lions Hall from 9am and Noon and all the money raised will go to Prostate Cancer Canada to help in the fight against that disease. So kids of all ages bring Dad along and treat him to a delicious breakfast. There'll be scrambled eggs, sausages, fresh fruit, fruit juices, coffee, tea and of course stacks of pancakes. You won't need to bring much money either as its only \$7 (\$3.50 for children under 12).

After that is over the Lions will be busy preparing for the summer Fiesta on July 30, but we'll tell you more of that in the July *Active Page*.

Galiano Island Parks and Recreation Commission Report

Continuing Shore Access improvements underway are Oceanview (23) on Southwind Road; Zelter (65) on Cayzer; and Zilwood (31) at Retreat Cove which has been re-surveyed to clarify the boundaries. The Valerie Place (48) Access sign and post on Deacon Lane is being replaced. Members of the GIPRC met with neighbours of the Salamanca (58) shore access, concern was expressed that the wildflowers in the area be protected and a wildflower area sign will be put in place. A load of gravel will be brought in to the Cain Road Shore Access (3) to cover the exposed cable and level out the access.

There is an access between Georgia View Road and Sticks Allison Road West which has been used and maintained since before I moved here in 1989. GIPRC is considering applying for a Licence of Occupation from MOT but we would like to speak with the person who has been taking care of it. No one seems to know who this Good Samaritan is so if they would contact one of us or attend the next meeting we would like to speak with you.

Rockfish Protection Area signs are being acquired from the Vancouver Aquarium and will be erected at six shore accesses which lead to them: Shaw's Landing (34), Dewinetz (50) on Bodega Beach Drive, Cain Road (3), Gulf Drive (4), Azure (27) at Ganner Drive and Zilwood (31) at Retreat Cove.

May 31 was the deadline for applications for programming from 1 September 2011 to 31 August 2012. All applications will be reviewed and decisions will be made in June.

Police Report

Cst Dewolf, Outer Gulf Islands RCMP

Over the past month, the Outer Gulf Islands RCMP responded to 104 calls for service. As a result of these calls, charges have been recommended to Provincial Crown Counsel against three individuals for uttering threats, assault, obstruction and driving while prohibited. Galiano Island has been particularly busy as the summer season is quickly approaching.

Here is a brief recap:

During the late evening / early morning of April 29, the Outer Gulf Islands RCMP responded to a call of a missing hiker on Mount Galiano. Police activated Search and Rescue and the Police Dog Service out of Westshore RCMP and prepared to begin a full scale search at first light. Prior to the search beginning, the hiker made her way out of the trails on her own without incident. Reportedly, this experienced hiker stayed out too late in the evening and lost sufficient light to hike her way out safely. I would like to take this opportunity to remind residents of Galiano to ensure you are safe when hiking on Galiano this season by always letting someone know where you are going and ensuring that you are out of the trails prior to night fall.

Also on April 29, Police feared the worst when an abandoned scooter was reported at "Lovers Leap" on Porlier Pass Rd. This scooter had been parked at this location for several days. Searches were conducted above and below "Lover Leap"

before further investigation uncovered that this scooter had simply broke down and the scooter owner was unharmed.

On April 9, Police were involved in an impaired driving investigation during a road block on Sturdies Bay Rd at Cayzer Rd. The driver initially stopped for police before driving away at a very high rate of speed contrary to police direction to pull over. This vehicle was followed and located a short time later. The driver was identified and the vehicle was impounded. Charges are being recommended for driving while prohibited and obstructing a police officer.

Sometime between April 1 and May 10, two 30 lbs propane tanks were stolen from a property on McCoskrie Rd. The property owner was away from the property during the time of this theft. Anyone with information regarding this theft is asked to call the Outer Gulf Islands RCMP at 250-539-2309 or Crime Stoppers. Alternatively, you could simply flag me down when you see me driving on Galiano (that works too).

Speeding on Galiano Island continues to a problem despite my best efforts to remind drivers about their speed through vehicle stops and many verbal and written warnings. I will be increasing my traffic enforcement on Galiano Island starting immediately focusing on speed and seatbelts. If you are found driving well over the posted speed limit you can expect to be stopped and issued a violation ticket. A ticket for speeding (less the 21 km/hr over) is \$138 and a ticket for speeding (21 km to 40 km/hr over) is \$196. A violation ticket for excessive speed is \$368. Drive safe.







Bird Notes

Spring migration

We've experienced an unusually cool and wet spring and several migratory songbird species were noticeably delayed in their arrival on Galiano. However as I write this in mid-May, many of the expected migratory species have made their appearance, including Western Tanager, Black-headed Grosbeak, House Wren and Cassin's Vireo. Others should show up within a few days, including Olive-sided Flycatcher, Swainson's Thrush and Common Nighthawk.

The warblers are another group of spring-arriving migrants. Eight species of these colourful, active small insectivorous birds breed here. When they first arrive they can be found in a variety of local habitats, but eventually the different species sort themselves into their preferred habitats for feeding and nesting. For example, Townsend's Warblers occupy the upper canopy of coniferous forest and Wilson's and Orange-crowned Warblers concentrate on lower level young deciduous trees and shrubs, which often brings them into our gardens.

Two of the warbler species are particularly drawn to wetland areas – Yellow Warbler and Common Yellowthroat. An early May walk alongside the Cook Road wetlands provided a group of local birdwatchers with an opportunity to see and hear several individuals of the latter species on their breeding territories. Common Yellowthroat is an unmistakable bird, with an olivegreen back and wings, a white belly and a bright yellow chest and throat. Most distinctive is the male's "raccoon" black mask. (See photo) Also distinctive is the witchity, witchity, witchity song of the male.

Calliope Hummingbird!!

On May 14 a very tiny bird ran into a window at Brian Mitchell and Louise Decario's home on Linklater. Fortunately for the bird, Brian quickly picked it up and revived it with the heat of his hand and it was able to fly away. Fortunately for us, Louise thought to get a camera and photograph the bird in Brian's hand (see photo) and thus we have the first confirmed record of a male Calliope Hummingbird on Galiano. This is a rarity for southern Vancouver Island and there have only been a few confirmed records for Victoria. This is a hummingbird usually found in the interior of BC, including the Okanagan and the Kootenays in the southeast of the Province.

The Calliope Hummingbird is the smallest North American hummingbird (a bit over 8 cm or 3 in) and therefore the smallest bird species of all in North America. The male Calliope Hummingbird has a green back and distinctive "ribbons" of rose-coloured throat feathers against a white background. Calliopes spend the winter in Mexico and migrate north at this time of year to breed. Presumably the bird in the photo took a wrong turn westward somewhere along the way.

Attack Grouse

Early in May Peter Thomson encountered a male Sooty Grouse partway up island on Porlier Pass Road. He said that he first noticed the chicken-sized bird when it began to chase his truck. He couldn't believe what he was seeing so he slowed down and when the bird gained on him, he sped up and the bird kept coming. Peter returned the next day with a camera, in case the bird was still there and it was. This time Peter got out of the truck and the bird ran up to him, pecked at his boot and flew up

into the air in front of him! In this flurry of activity Peter managed to take a photo of the bird.

Sooty Grouse is what we used to know as the dark coastal sub-species of Blue Grouse, but it has now been elevated to the status of a species in its own right. (The other former BC sub-species, a paler type found in the interior, is now a separate species known as Dusky Grouse.) Sooty Grouse are large game birds (50 cm or 20 in long, 1 kg or 2.2 pounds in weight), with gray plumage, brownish gray wings and a broad gray stripe at the end of the tail. Male Sooty Grouse have prominent bright orange to red "eyebrows" that are visible in the photo. The males are responsible for the very low frequency hooting or booming that is heard in the woods at this time of year. As Peter discovered, the males can be quite aggressive towards anything that enters their territory during breeding season!

Ho'oponopono - A Way of Forgiveness

Having received such encouraging feedback from my last article "Storyboard of Life" I am going to venture sharing some more thoughts and insights about the nature of conflict and approaches that can bridge differences rather than building walls that perpetuate them.

The last paragraph of that article was a call for action... "If we are ever to create peace on earth as we claim to want, it starts here, with me, with you, being accountable for our feelings and reactions, dropping the stories that feed separation, violence and judgment. We all need to do our part to restore that which is good, clean up our stories, be accountable, make peace and extend friendship and love, even when it's hard, for that's when it counts the most. As Gandhi says, 'Be the Change you want to see in the world.' And it will change."

So how do we do that? What does that action look like? Is it really possible?

What makes it possible is simply being willing to expand our perceptions to include more than our ideas, wants and needs, to consider the others' existence rather than focusing only on our own. Take a deep breath. In this space, forgiveness is effortless.

The moment I am willing to see more than what I can presently see, when I admit that my perception is biased to my story and drama, a door opens in me and a new beam of light can enter in and illuminate my vision. But first I have to be willing; willing to let go of my need to be right. Let go of my need to prove and defend my case. Let go of my need to judge and so make myself better than another. I need to be willing to serve love and goodness rather than anger and violence.

Rumi has a beautiful poem to reflect that state of willingness. "Far beyond the reaches of right and wrong, there is a field, I will meet you there." There is a deep quality of love and humility in that statement. That is what is needed, anything less perpetuates and encourages the human drama of violent action. Take a deep breath.

Are you, who are reading this, willing to go there? To extend your beliefs beyond right and wrong to restore love? To bridge differences that cause painful separation with people, family and friends you once loved and shared laughter with? Or do you need to stand cemented in your beliefs, fighting to the death to prove you are right and only your way and perception counts? The latter is the easy way out. It doesn't demand any self-reflection or work and is unfortunately the most common trodden path on the planet. Whereas the former demands a lot of work and time to uncover what is not so obvious, to reveal the insights needed to understand ourselves and another.

Guess which action bares the harvest we all hunger for... Are you willing? That is the question that needs to be investigated and answered before any other movement can take place. Make your choice and live by it. For in essence it is all about choice, for which only I am responsible. I choose to direct my inner compass towards understanding or towards resentment and that choice creates the momentum that feeds and creates my reality. It's very simple. If I am not reaping the harvest I want than I need to take a closer look at my actions and choices that are creating the reality

If a farmer doesn't tend to every little detail and every stage of growth in his fields, how can he expect to get the best crop ever? It's the same principle in human relationships, both with self and others. We are each a garden, an eco system with many

sub eco systems, unique and sovereign. I need to educate myself on what best serves the various eco systems within me and those who I am close to in order to respect and take care appropriately so that we can all grow and reap a good harvest. I need to be willing to see that not all eco systems are like mine and stop expecting them to be.

Ho'oponopono is an ancient practice of Forgiveness from Hawaii, a practice that has genuinely helped me to go deeper into the hurts and pains that once clouded my vision that caused me to be hurtful and self-righteous unintentionally in response to hurtful events. It's a form of conflict resolution to keep harmony and peace. The foundation of Ho'oponopono is that all beings are in essence equal and innocent and are acts of Creation/God, so no one is above or below another. We meet in our mutual humanity as equals, which immediately subdues the need to dominate or control another with our judgments and need to be right. The sovereignty and validity of each human experience is respected and honored. Wow! Imagine meeting everyone like that? Where would there be conflict?

Even if some don't match me and my needs, it is not dependent on how they choose to meet me or not. It's about me relating to the conflict in me and clearing it. And here's the kicker from which no ego can escape; that I am responsible for everything in my world, that everything outside of me is a reflection of something in me.

Take a deep breath. There are many layers of understanding behind that statement to explore.

It is the simple understanding that all things in creation are governed by the Law of Resonance and Magnetism. Like attracts like, both in the positive and the negative. If my wound or belief is that I am unworthy of love than I will perpetually attract people that are not able to love me and will perhaps abuse me... my pattern is confirmed and sealed as is theirs. It's a perfect match. (I speak from experience here!)

For me, that reflection of truth continually empowers me to make the changes I need to heal and create the reality I want, by going deep and owning my part in every painful and traumatic experience I have lived through. As long as I am playing the victim and blaming everything outside of me for my woes, I am trapped and will keep recreating the same situations that confirm my patterns and victimhood. Nothing will change. The walls of resentment and judgment will only get thicker. Growth and expansion of my heart is no longer a possibility. If I want love to fill my life I need to create it within me. I need to claim my sovereignty and inner authority to change and affect my life for the better. It all starts with me. My favorite line in a 90's club song is 'Love cannot remain as long as you complain.' Another good one, 'When you accuse, you lose.' Think about it.

I love you. I'm sorry. Please forgive me. Thank-you.

These declarations are the key to Ho'oponopono. I love you, to the act of Creation/God that is you. I am sorry, for my part in this conflict. Please forgive me, for my hurtful thoughts, actions and deeds that have fed the separation of our hearts. Thank-you, expressing gratitude for the healing... knowing that by this action, it is done.

This is practised internally as a way to claim our accountability and redirect our focus to a more constructive and loving way of perceiving and resolving conflict within ourselves first and foremost. Then it ripples to the outer. 'Be the change you want to see in the world.' Ho'oponopono is a definite clear path we can explore and embody, regardless of faith, religion or creed, to do just that. Try it. Love is always a better harvest. Nourish your garden well. Aloha.

Islands Trust: Local Trustees Report

Proposed Bylaws 209, 211 and 212 Community Information Meeting and Public Hearing

The May 9th meeting of the Local Trust Committee (LTC) began with a Community Information meeting and a Public Hearing on three bylaw amendments. Approximately 20 people were in attendance. Now that the Public Hearing is over, trustees can no longer receive new information about these bylaws. We can, however, report on the results of the meeting. Proposed Land Use Bylaw (LUB) 209 was widely supported and later in the meeting was given third reading and sent to the Islands Trust Executive Committee for approval. This bylaw includes some general updating, clarification of setback requirements, fence heights, addition of "guest services" in the C3 Zone (Visitor Accommodation), allows foot bridges and walkways in the Parks and Recreation Zone, increases the allowable size of accessory buildings on agricultural land, removes target ranges as a permit use on R3 zoned lands and amends some definitions.

Proposed OCP Bylaw 211 and proposed LUB Bylaw 212 are both about mapping amendments concerning sixteen OCP changes and twelve LUB changes. Three people spoke against putting BC Parks land into Nature Protection and one person spoke against changing an R3 property to R2. The remaining four speakers were in favour of the bylaws as written. Both bylaws were given third reading and have been forwarded to the Executive Committee for approval. If approved, the OCP bylaw will be forwarded to the Ministry of Community, Sport and Cultural Development for their approval.

Official Community Plan (OCP) Review

Draft 7 is complete and has been sent off to various agencies plus the Advisory Planning Committee and the Executive Committee for initial comment. This draft has not received first reading as we first wish to hear comments and consider recommended amendments before doing so. Draft 7 includes some needed policy changes for agriculture, housing, climate change, sensitive ecosystems, and water protection. The forest section has also been revised and now offers a residential use accessory to the forest use without rezoning for owners of large lots. This added use is conditional on roads, emergency access and siting away from sensitive ecosystems. Many large forest lots already have public road access so this will not be a problem for them. The over 50 acre forest zoned lands comprise over 80% of the forest designated lands on Galiano.

This is a significant step for change in policy. The remaining 20% is in smaller lots and owners of those lots have options too. They could combine lots by covenant, or make boundary changes, or rezone to Forest Industrial in order to gain an accessory residential use. Several Advisory committees as well as your trustees have worked hard to balance our Forest Objectives, Trust Policy and owners' interests.

Changes to the forest section are, however, contingent on obtaining exemption from s. 21 of the Private Managed Forest Land Act (PMFLA). This was recommended by four Advisory Committees. At the time of writing, a request for exemption has been sent to the ministry and we expect a reply soon. In the event we do not receive the exemption we have directed staff to draft bylaws which will not offend the PMFLA. This would mean that the Forest policy changes in Draft 7 mentioned above would not go forward.

Galiano Groundwater Study

As part of the OCP review, the LTC commissioned Waterline Resources Inc. (Waterline) to complete a groundwater study. The objectives were:

- to review past studies and all other available information for identifying critical groundwater areas including recharge and water deficient areas;
- to perform a data gap analysis and to propose a program for collecting data; and,
- to assess the existing and potential land use impacts on critical groundwater areas and to propose management strategies to mitigate or prevent further impacts.

Darren David and Shelley Bayne from Waterline, the authors of the report, presented their findings at the April meeting. Both the LTC and the audience were impressed with the report and were grateful for the information supplied. At the next LTC meeting we will discuss options for implementing some of the recommendations suggested.

True Things About Me by Deborah Kay Davies - As much as there's a sub genre of fiction that I identify with and usually enjoy the most, I am thrilled by any book that makes me feel something. Anything. Anger, despair, joy, love or fear. Any emotion will do. What this novel has going for it is that it covers all of the emotional bases and then some. The reader is a prodded tiger, a mother bear with her cubs in danger, a snake in the grass. Although the cover blurb gives one the sense that some pretty bad things are about to happen, it really doesn't prepare you for what's to come. This, among other things, is what makes Davies a fierce writer. You don't just stroll through her novel; you hack through it like a jungle and make a path as though you're the first person to read the novel - ever. The story is a tale of obsession. A woman becomes completely obsessed with a man that she meets only for a few moments before they become rather intimately acquainted. From that point onward, she unravels as she goes to unending lengths to see him, to be with him and to become his. He is unknown and dangerous and romantically stifling but somehow she is undeterred. Some people may be able to relate. Sometimes those that are the least available seem to be the most interesting and intoxicating. I can't tell you what happens as the story spirals out of control, but I will tell you that there are so many heart-stopping moments of unpredictable evil, insanity, lust and rage that you're glued to the pages until the end. Hitting the back cover of this book made me breathe deeply, blowing out one word as I exhaled: "Yikes". Go ahead and dive in. Don't say I didn't warn you.

Event Review: Book Launch & Author Reading with Barry New (took place Sunday, May 15 at Galiano Island Books). It was a dark and stormy afternoon...wait, that sounds scary. I'll start over: It was a cozy and rainy afternoon and a room full of history buffs gathered at the bookstore to help us welcome Barry New's book The War Letters of Donald New into the world. If you have lived on Galiano for any real length of time, you are probably familiar with the New family. David New's column "Old News" graces the pages of this fine publication every month, Barry writes often and you've probably seen John around town at the recycling centre, or in his capacity as a member of the SGVFD. Perhaps you've seen Ralph and Peter around too. Wherever they are, the New family are one of the many cornerstones of history on Galiano. Barry's book, which he self-published, was a two year labour of love. He carefully researched, pored over and transcribed letters from his grandfather Donald to his sister and mother while he was in the First World War. Every great story begins with a grain of truth and these grains create a moving portrait through many years of carefully crafted letters. The photographs in the book add highlights and give the letters shape, letting the reader literally put faces to names. The event was intimate and sweet and special thanks to Barry for sharing this piece of his history and Galiano's history.

About the Author - Betty Krawczyk immigrated to Canada at the height of the Viet Nam War in 1966 with a physicist husband and six disgruntled children. The children were annoyed at being uprooted and the husband was temporarily jobless. These problems righted themselves soon enough. One major problem did not. Born and raised in the southern United States, Krawczyk found she couldn't tolerate the long winters of northern Ontario where her husband had found a teaching post. Eventually the family split up and Krawczyk moved to British Columbia where the rainforests were lush and the snow was sparse. Children grown, Krawczyk retired to the stunning beauty of the forests and waters of Clayoquot Sound on the west coast of Vancouver Island to live in a rustic A-frame built by her son Mike. By the time she discovered Clayoquot Sound Betty Krawczyk was already an experienced writer. She studied Creative Writing through the University of Oklahoma and had written primarily for women's pulp magazines. While she had also been active in human rights issues and women's issues, Krawczyk yearned to write about the natural world. Instead, she found herself writing about the destruction of the natural world by international logging companies.

In 1993 Krawczyk joined a group called "Friends of Clayoquot Sound" that blockaded logging trucks going into the Sound. And Krawczyk found herself in prison for the first time. But it wasn't the last. She was given three other more lengthy sentences for subsequent blockades and as this book goes to press is waiting to hear if the Supreme Court of Canada will hear her appeal on her last sentence for blocking at Eagleridge Bluffs in BC two years ago. "I am still on a blockade," Krawczyk says when questioned.

"I will be on a blockade as long as the BC government and BC courts give out injunctions to every pillaging, polluting, privatizing international logging corporation that asks for one. These forests give life and breath to us all. It's the ancient role of elders to be stewards of the land. I'm simply trying to do my job." Her previous books include Clayoquot: The Sound of my Heart, Lock Me Up or Let Me Go and Open and Living Confidential: From Inside the Joint.





Farming on Galiano – Fighting the Weather

Galiano Sunshine Farm - Roger and Lisa Pettit

This is the first of a series of articles written by the farmers of Galiano to promote food production on our island and the Galiano Saturday Market. We hope to encourage islanders to grow more on Galiano and come to the market to find what Galiano growers are producing.

The farms on Galiano are big gardens or smallish farms, rather than large commercial operations. Galiano Sunshine Farm is no exception. Though we own 15 acres, we will have about 2 acres in production this year at Vineyard Way, with additional production at Cable Bay Farm. Although we have a 45 horsepower tractor with a full range of implements, the techniques that we use are a combination of those used by gardeners and larger commercial growers. Many of you know that our principal crop is potatoes, but we grow a full range of vegetables from greens and cucurbits, to beans and corn. At this time of year, we would normally have much of our produce planted, but as of mid-May we have yet to plant a potato and we have very little else in the ground. We had planned to talk about potato growing, but we have been pre-empted by that topic that everyone talks about but nobody can do anything about - the weather.

At our home farm, the soil is sandy silt. Although there is a clayey-till-subsoil layer several feet below the surface, our soil is relatively well drained. After a spring rainfall in excess of 20 mm or 1 inch, our land takes about two days of drying before we can get back on it with our tractor. At Cable Bay Farm, even though tile drained, the clay loam soil requires three days to dry out. If we try to get back on the land too soon, not only do we make deep ruts, but we may permanently damage the soil

structure. There is an old axiom in farming – you cannot fight the weather. If you have raised beds surrounded by mulched or gravelled paths, you may get back into the garden the day after a hard rain, but be cautious of compaction. And planting into soil that is too wet can create problems.

So what should you do if you have a lot of potato seed and you cannot get into your garden? Well, you could do what we have done: you can chit, or green-sprout your seed potatoes. You begin to chit by taking the seed from your cool storage, then warming them up in a dark place for a couple of days. The ideal temperature would be about 20 degrees Celsius or 70 degrees Fahrenheit, but any place five or more degrees above freezing would be okay. After about two or three days, place the potatoes in a spaced single layer in a warm place where they will receive full light for about 8 hours a day. If the potatoes were not sprouted when you put them out, short green sprouts will develop.

The seed pieces you plant should be about 1.75 ounces or 50 grams and have two or three well developed eyes. If the potato has 3 to 5 sprouts, or more, developing in a cluster, scoop out that cluster, digging between 1 to 3 mm into the potato to remove the eyes. If that cluster is left to grow, week spindly plants will be likely and your yield will suffer. Do this as soon as you see the clusters developing and 2 or 3 days before you cut the seed. After you cut the seed, let the seed heal for a day or two before you plant it. If you chit for an extended period, or if your seed looks too dry, spray the potatoes lightly with a soluble nutrient solution, or plain water.

Good growing and good eating. See you at the market on opening day, June 25 at 10 am at the Lions Park.

Community kitchens

What are Community Kitchens?

You might have seen the posters around advertising one? Or maybe you received an email inviting you to one? And maybe you were wondering what a Community Kitchen is? A community kitchen is a group of people who get together regularly to cook and eat together and bring food home. We generally meet once a month. When we first encountered the community kitchen idea it was presented as a way to encourage people to improve their own health and nutrition, while also strengthening community ties.

The Community Kitchens' Project started in Vancouver in the mid-1990s, and has since grown to be a province wide organization. They are now an educational and informational resource centre for cooking and nutritional skill building programs across British Columbia. I have attended two workshops with them and try to bring back those skills to our community.

On Galiano we have added to the project a desire to use what is locally in season, and source food from local stores whenever possible. During the winter and spring we cook meals, and as harvest season comes we switch to canning and preserving kitchens, using gleaned produce whenever possible. Community Kitchens are about strengthening relationships with each other and improving our relationship with food.

At our community kitchens, the meal is planned ahead of time, based on what's available. The recipes are printed and the ingredients are gathered. When the participants arrive everyone goes where they want – choosing the thing they want to work on, and then small groups make that part of the menu, deciding for themselves how to proceed. Often they follow the recipe. Sometimes they don't. The food is always delicious. We eat together, sharing what we learned, or letting others know the changes that were made, and then we divide up the food that's left amongst the participants. Usually everyone gets two meals to take home. The kitchens run on a sliding scale of \$15-\$20.

They have had to change and change a great deal. But they have not yet entirely merged with the newcomers and lost their identity as Indians. Horsfield, Margaret, Cougar Annie's Garden, Salal Books, Nanaimo, B.C., 2003, Third printing with revisions. "In 1915, Ada Annie Rae-Arthur came to Boat Basin, on Vancouver Island's west coast, as a pioneer settler. Determined to make a new life for herself and her family, she set to work clearing the land. A garden of strange, meandering beauty slowly emerged from the deep forest. Cougars prowled nearby, sensing easy prey. Ada Annie trapped and shot dozens of them. She became known as Cougar Annie. Wily and ingenious, she ran a nursery garden, a general store and a post office from her home. She bore eight of her eleven children at Boat Basin and outlasted four husbands. Until her mid-nineties, she remained in her beloved garden. Many types of West Coast lore, many strands of history combine in this book to weave together Courgar Annie's story and to relate the history of this part of the coast. Galiano Conservancy Association Annual General Meeting

"How do we respectfully intervene in ecosystems under conditions of rapid change?" This was among the many thought-provoking questions posed by Eric Higgs, the featured speaker at the Conservancy AGM. Eric, Professor of Environmental Studies at UVic, author and well known environmentalist, spoke on the topic of "Restoring Ecosystems, Recovering Hope". He spoke of the importance of emphasizing social connections in doing restorative work. For example, he described a project in Victoria's Beacon Hill Park to protect a small Douglas Fir ecosystem. A key to the success of the project was its focus on social issues such as homelessness as well as on the physical work of restoration. He noted that in any circumstance, when people work to restore land to a natural state, a bond is created in those people to the land.

Eric noted the reality of climate change in graphic terms. Despite this year's cold, wet spring, we are living with the reality of a warming planet. He provided graphic photographic evidence of the upward shift of the tree line over the last century in the mountains of south eastern British Columbia. In fact this area has the second greatest documented treeline change in the world. One of his conclusions was that we had to be prepared to adapt to new realities as climate change modifies our natural environment. However, as he quoted, "the fact of change need not mean that we accept any change".

Eric's talk was warmly received by the well attended meeting – his analysis surely struck a chord as he expressed in analytical terms what has been the practice of the Conservancy since its inception.

In other business at the AGM, a new Board of Directors was elected. The Board now consists of returning Directors, Ken Millard, Ursula Deshield, Rose Longini, Dave Ages, Cheryl Bastedo, Carolyn Canfield, Brian Mitchell, Gary Moore, John Pritchard, Peter Reiner, Loren Wilkinson and Jane Wolverton, along with new Directors, Paul Kopas and Risa Smith. The meeting thanked Andy Turner, who has stepped down, for his service on the Board.

Reports were given by our dedicated, hard working staff on the many initiatives and accomplishments from this past year. A greenhouse has now been built at our Native Plant Nursery. Our Education Program, led by Patti Pringle and Pauline Brest van Kampen, continues to provide a vast array of environmental experiences for local and off-Island young people. Reports by Conservation Co-ordinator Keith Erickson and Biologist Alana Jung focused on the huge amount of work done in the areas of protecting and restoring lands and identifying and protecting species at risk. Restorative Learning Centre Co-ordinator Emily Menzies presented a video which described the work of the Conservancy in the context of our Learning Centre Initiative. Co-ordinator Ken Millard noted that this project is well on the way to fruition with almost 75% of the necessary funding in place.

Mike Hoebel reported that Active Pass is being officially designated as an Important Bird Area (IBA) to help protect its populations of Pacific Loons, Brandt's Cormorants and Bonaparte's Gulls, all of which appear to be declining in numbers. The Galiano Conservancy and the Mayne

Conservancy will be the joint administrators with funding from various sources including Vancity. Watch for signage soon to appear at Bellhouse Park.

Appreciation was expressed for the various people who have volunteered their time and skills to the Conservancy over the last year with a special thanks to Brad Lockett who has stepped in, for now, as driver of our new bus.

After the meeting many of the members gathered at the Conservancy office for a rousing potluck dinner.

Fire Prevention Plan

Once again your cooperation to prevent fires on Galiano Island during the summer months is requested. We can accomplish this very simply. Debris can be cleared, deadfalls removed and shrubs around driveways and roadways should be trimmed. The road access to the property should be at least 4.5 metres (13 feet) wide, with height clearance of the same.

Fire Hazard Signs are posted. These are changed daily for your information and safety. They are located at Cain road, Porlier Pass, South Galiano Fire Hall and Sturdies Bay triangle. Your summer guests should also be advised of locations.

It's hard to visualize with this cool wet spring hanging on, but the forecast is for another hot dry summer.

Here are some precautions we can take to minimize the risk during the dry season.

Keep your roof clear of branches, twigs and other debris.

Make sure flammable materials aren't stored or stacked close to the house.

Prune lower branches of nearby trees, up to 2.5 meters from the ground.

Clear brush for a distance of 10 meters from the house and rake up and remove any accumulations of dead leaves and branches lying close to the house.

If you have a source of water suitable for fire fighting, make sure that it is accessible in an emergency.

If you have grass-covered areas, either keep the grass well-watered, or keep it short.

Agree on evacuation procedures with everyone in the house and keep escape routes always clear.

Galiano Emergency Program - Unnatural Disasters

When (not "if" – I hope!) we think about Emergency Preparedness on Galiano, we usually think about wildfires, extended power outages or earthquakes. But last

month while in Halifax for a conference, I was reminded of another kind of potential disaster – a man-made one.

My son recommended that I visit the Maritime Museum of the Atlantic to see the exhibit on the massive explosion which leveled the city of Halifax on December 6, 1917, when the French cargo ship, the SS Mont-Blanc, loaded with explosives, accidentally collided with the Norwegian ship SS Imo in the narrow Bedford Basin of Halifax harbour. About 2,000 people on shore were killed by debris, fires, or collapsing buildings and more than 9,000 people were injured. The exhibit was sobering, with photos, artifacts and a video, but I was particularly struck by the descriptions of how the community responded – by setting up what we would call Reception Centres in schools, providing food, water and comfort for the survivors and helping the lucky ones to reestablish themselves. There was no formal emergency program in place, but an administrative structure was quickly set up to deal with the money and donations that came pouring in. This was almost 100 years ago and I wonder if we've learned very much, especially when I think about massive oil tankers making their way up the Strait of Georgia past Morning Beach, Pebble Beach and some of the other beautiful natural waterfront areas of Galiano. I hope I never find out how we would cope in such an event, but it reminds me that natural disasters aren't the only ones we're vulnerable to. For more information, visit http://www.cbc.ca/ halifaxexplosion/ and if you can, watch the excellent CBCproduced docudrama – "Shattered City: The Halifax Explosion".

To help keep our community as safe as we can, we held our regular bi-monthly CERT meeting on May 2. In his report, Ian Elliott, Area Coordinator for the SGIEP (Southern Gulf Islands Emergency Program), reminded us that fire season is right around the corner and that we need to be as organized and self-sufficient as possible to minimize the possible effects of another wildfire like the one we experienced in 2006. One of the ways we do this is to take advantage of the training opportunities available, such as the E-team training that several of us will be attending on May 24. There are other courses coming up as well – most importantly Registration and Referrals – so if you're interested in joining our team and coming to the training, please let me know as soon as possible. In other ESS news, Mike Hoebel has agreed to become our new South Galiano Deputy ESSD (Emergency Support Services Director) and Gloria Olson has taken on the role of South Galiano Neighbourhood Coordinator. Our next CERT meeting will be held on July 11 at the North Galiano Community Hall – please join us!

In addition to the CERT meetings, we've also started to provide workshops and presentations for the public. The first one, on Earthquake Emergency Preparedness, took place on May 15th. Brigitte Prochaska, Southern Gulf Islands Area ESSD, gave an informative presentation on how to prepare for the 'Big One', interrupted by lots of questions and comments from the audience. We were fortunate to have Diana Lily there as well, who shared some her personal impressions about the earthquakes in Christchurch. Joy Wilson, our much-appreciated BC Ambulance

Garden Club Notes - June 2011

At the May meeting, Dorian Nickells from the Canadian Food Inspection Agency provided information about the correct procedures for importing or exporting plants.

The Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) is responsible for safeguarding food, animals and plants. It has a number of subdivisions responsible for things such as forests, grains, field crops, seeds, pests, exports and imports. Its activities are also categorized as either regulation or research. Some of the main tasks of the CFIA are import inspections, export inspections and plant and pest surveys. Regulated products include flower bulbs, cuttings, trees and shrubs, insects and fruits and vegetables.

Export procedures: First, contact CFIA at 250.363.3618 to learn whether your proposed export is acceptable to the country of destination and to learn how to prepare your shipment (removal of soil or leaves and the application of pesticides may be required). Arrange to get a phytosanitary certificate if it is required. Then get the recipient to obtain an import permit from their country. It is important to fill out these forms correctly and to be aware that regulations change often.

Import procedures: First, contact CFIA at 250.363.3618 to learn whether an import permit is required and possible for the plants you propose to import. Some endangered species cannot be imported. Find out if a plant inspection will be required after the plants arrive. After applying for the permit, you should send the exporter a copy of the permit.

If you plan to bring plants across the border yourself, you need to declare the plants, present your import permit and your phytosanitary certificate. If your import is shipped to you, you should notify CFIA before you open the package to determine if a plant inspection is necessary.

There are good reasons for these requirements. Various pests have been introduced from plant importations that have greatly affected Canadian crops and other plants. For example, the golden nematode has destroyed the potato crop in central Saanich. As a result, commercial growing of potatoes is now forbidden in this area. The emerald ash borer has infected ash trees in eastern Canada, resulting in the need to destroy many trees in the affected area.

The CFIA makes regular pest surveys. Some of the pests now surveyed include the gypsy moth, the Japanese beetle, the blueberry maggot, the emerald ash borer and the apple maggot.

At the next meeting on June 8, Gordon MacKay of Alba Plants in Cowichan Bay will present a slide show called More Gems for the Rock Garden. He specializes in conifers and alpines and he will bring a few plants for sale.


